The Apostle Paul was a man full of the Spirit and he demonstrated the power of the Holy Spirit in his ministry.

"Pray also for me, that whenever I open my mouth, words may be given me so that I will fearlessly make known the mystery of the gospel, for which I am an ambassador in chains. Pray that I may declare it fearlessly, as I should."

~ Ephesians 6:19-20

Here he asked the Ephesian believers to pray for him so that whenever he spoke, words may be given to him by the Lord so that he will fearlessly make known the mystery of the gospel. And this request was made when he was actually in prison for preaching the gospel! Nothing and no one could stop him from telling others about Jesus. Why? It is simply because Paul was full of the Spirit.

But how many people who claim to be Spirit-filled today would preach Christ fearlessly like Paul? The Christian faith today can be rather consumeristic – with an unhealthy fixation on receiving and being blessed rather than giving and blessing others. The result of it is that churches can, and have in some cases, lost their passion for the lost and have allowed it to be replaced by a passion for church activities that merely excite Christians but do not convert souls.

The heart of the Christian faith is about Jesus, who came to seek and save the lost. If our Christianity does not involve seeking and saving of the lost, then we have lost the heart of the Christian faith. And all our Christian/church activities are meaningless no matter how cool we look and how vibrant our church may appear.

Let us pray that you, me, and all Christians may truly walk in the fullness of the Spirit, and be fearless witnesses of Christ and all He has done. May the Holy Spirit restore to us a passion for those who are lost so that the church will never be a luxury cruise but always remain a rescue boat.

WHAT COMPELS A PERSON TO TRAVEL TO EVERY COUNTRY IN THE WORLD (INCLUDING ANTARCTICA) IN THE SHORT SPAN OF 6 YEARS, 6 MONTHS AND 22 DAYS, AND BREAK THE WORLD RECORD AS THE FASTEST MAN EVER TO VISIT ALL 257 COUNTRIES IN THE WORLD?

Dr Benny Prasad strongly believes there is a pressing need for the hope of Christ in all countries in the world, and that someone needs to tell them about it. So he did.

"In some places there is a need because they've never heard the gospel before. Other places have many nominal Christians who have never had a personal encounter with Jesus and do not have a personal understanding of salvation. And then there are places where people have known the gospel but they have backslidden, fallen away from God, and they need someone to encourage them to come back.

But Benny didn't start out in life as the most likely candidate to become a globetrotting musician and evangelist.

Being a sickly child who also continuously failed at many academic endeavours, Benny grappled with deep depression and thoughts of suicide in his teenage years. But after experiencing the life-transforming power that followed his first encounter with Jesus, he set out to encourage others in every nation to believe God for miracles and purpose in life.

He has performed Christian worship music on the bongo-guitar (which he invented himself) in front of presidents and Olympians, and although he lives without a full set of healthy lungs, he often also plays the pan flute at his concerts to testify to the fact that nothing is impossible with God. Although he is often introduced as a musician to the crowds, he keeps his Christian testimony as the centerpiece of every performance, taking more time to tell his story than he does to perform music.

"My music has been secondary to my testimony. Even though everyone loves music and every people group has music, it can be quite subjective to individual's tastes. Some people might like rock music, some like jazz, some like classical, so even though I am a musician I can potentially put off a listener who doesn't like the genre of music I play. I have seen a greater positive response towards the stories I share about my life's journey."

In order to connect with people across different cultures and traditions, Benny employs a principle called 'using the known to reach the unknown'. He first tries to find some common ground between himself and the person he is conversing with. "If I meet a footballer, I could talk about my performance at the FIFA World Cup. If I meet a scientist or innovator, I could chat about the processes of inventing a guitar. Then I start to bring in the aspect of who Jesus is to me and how my life changed after I met him."

Where there are significant language barriers, Benny relies on translators or videos that are in the local dialect. He whips out his mobile phone and loads the video, offers them earphones and says "hey, can you watch this story?"

These days, Benny spends more of his time in his hometown of Bangalore at café Chai3:16, a non-commercial, 400 seater café which he set up as a venue for frustrated students and young adults to come and have a free cup of tea and chat with trained counsellors and Christian volunteers.

Volunteers from around the world and from all walks of life serve as waiters and waitresses there, and take time to listen to the problems of patrons. Their goal is to have them leave the café feeling loved and valued, the way Jesus loves and values all of us. The facility also has 10 rooms that can accommodate 20 full time staff and 7 rooms for 28 people who wish to serve on short-term mission trips.

Partnering him in this ministry is Zanbeni, who comes from a small, picturesque Indian state called Nagaland. They married in August last year after what Benny jokingly refers to his "40 years of wandering in the desert." They first met at a Youth With A Mission (YWAM) event and their relationship blossomed as they worked together on the Chai3:16 project.

"She sings but I can't. I play an instrument but she can't. I can talk. She can listen well. So this ministry of testimony sharing and listening and music is really a beautiful God-given blend in our efforts to reach out to the lost."





TOAST & BUTTER'S Bintan Adventure

I belong to an IGNITE youth ministry care group called Toast & Butter (or T&B for short).

We are a small group of 19-year-old growing Christians shepherded by two incredibly patient young adults, Sean Teoh and Odelia Lim. The bulk of us have just begun our final year in our tertiary institutions, and the others will soon be

embarking on a new journey in different universities.

On the second weekend in March we set off on our very first outreach trip to Bintan as a care group. This was the Saturday after most of us had just finished our last exam paper of the season. We were all excited but also a little fearful – it was the first time many of us had done something like this, but we also knew God had incredible things in store for us in Bintan.

We filed up the Tanah Merah Ferry Terminal jetty with passport in hand, guitar slung over the shoulder of our most musical member, all of us still trying to remember the song lyrics and dance moves we had learned a couple of days ago.

The main focus of this trip was children's ministry and we had been asked to prepare three worship songs with dance actions to go along with them for a session of children's worship. Hui Yan took care of preparing PowerPoint slides for the songs, Rebecca cooked up the dance moves, and our musically gifted guys Kendrick and Daniel were selected to lead worship using a portable set of speakers. The rest of us... well we were the 'extras'. (But we didn't mind!)

When it comes to children, you could split T&B nicely into two groups – the 'Swooners' and the 'Walk-Away-ers'. I was excited to see how God would use the bunch of us to engage the children regardless of our preferences, and I was not disappointed! My CG mates rose to the occasion and got the Bintan kids to join in with the singing and dancing.

By the end of the worship session, most of us were drenched in sweat! Kendrick even unknowingly managed to rally a group of young 'followers' who would chase him around the village and challenge him to multiple handstand-offs.

Not everything went perfectly according to plan though. When we reached the village, we were told there had been an electricity blackout since the previous day. That meant that we could no longer use our PowerPoint slides or portable speakers as planned. We thanked God for the mahjong paper and markers that were handed to us in the nick of time, and guitar we had decided to bring along.

The team had also planned for a video to be screened after the worship segment, and there was really no way to show it to the huge crowd of except by using a projector. But without electricity that was useless.

I uttered a quick prayer for electricity before worship started, and then we launched into the handwritten songs. Right after we had finished singing the last song, I noticed the fan in front of me suddenly begin to oscillate! That meant the electricity was back and the video lesson was saved! This incident was such a great reminder to all of us that God is closer than we think and that in His time, everything will be made perfect.

The following day, one group of us visited homes to chat with locals, while another group explored the village on foot and prayed. I was in the latter group. As we walked around, it dawned on me that almost every house I passed had a piece of red paper stuck above its entrance, indicating that a Buddhist or Taoist family lived there. But then we came to a house that looked different – they had stuck a cross above their main door.

I felt God impress on me that the cross was there because someone had been praying for this family. Then I realised each of us could make a significant difference to the village because one more person praying meant an even louder cry to the heavens.

We all left Bintan touched by God in some way, with different lessons in our hearts. Before going there I had asked God for a testimony to share when I came back. I thank Him for being able to share this with Witness and at Ignite youth service.



TOAST & BUTTER has a CG catchphrase that goes like this: "Our life is a zoo and Jesus is our zookeeper." Sarah still gets confused by that catchphrase every now and again.

These thoughts were coupled with uncertainties about the mission field that further held me back: Will there be clean toilets? What if I get rejected?

Stanley and I had committed to serve and grow together in our walk with Christ after our wedding last September, but neither of us had ever been on a mission trip and struggled with inertia about it. But during the GoNations conference we attended at CMC in January, I found my heart stirred by speaker Joseph Chean's challenge for us to step out of our comfort zone and answer our Father's call. In particular, I was struck by the question, "have our blessings become a stumbling block for reaching out to His nations?" Surely, this is not our Father's intent.

We signed on to be part of a group of 20, including three children, which was led by our church staff Hoi Kok Fu. The 2-Day 1-Night trip was focused on giving free medical care to locals but there were other roles which did not require medical training.

Stanley was assigned to 'glucose screening' while my role as 'befriender' was to chat with locals waiting in line to be seen by one of our doctors.

As the locals in the village primarily spoke Bahasa Indonesia and Teochew, I doubted if I could converse with them. But I was reminded of 2 Corinthians 12:9 and 1

Corinthians 1:27-29, which assures us that God does not call the equipped but rather He equips the called. Furthermore, we were not alone but supported by many other CMC team members on the trip, as well as a local facilitator.

On the morning we set up the medical clinic, queues

had started forming at the registration counter even before we opened. It was heartwarming to see how every CMC team member sprang into action and gave their all to serving these people.

Throughout the day children from Singapore and Bintan played and bonded with one

another through a game of Jenga despite not speaking the same language. And even when one villager came by after we had closed the clinic for the day, my fellow team member Doctor Sunil went up to the door and ushered her in saying "Come! Come!" Clearly God was at work in our midst.

I was deeply impressed by a family of three that I met on one of our home visits. This is not the nuclear family unit that we are used to – a 60-year old grandmother was living with her two grandchildren, aged five and three. I later learned that the children had been abandoned by their father even before the younger was born.

Their mum is only 23 years old and works as a performer to make ends meet, so she is often travelling and has to leave the children in their grandmother's care. I was deeply impacted by the innocence of these two children and how attached they were to their grandmother as the main caregiver and comforter.

Our translator, Ah Gim, also shared that this grandmother had decided to dispose of all religious altars in her home and disassociate herself with her past beliefs after she came to know Christ through caring friends. Her neighbours had frowned on this decision, but she had boldly declared to them that love and sincerity



demonstrated by the church during her time of hardship is what convinced her that Jesus is the true way. Praise the Lord!

With God's grace and strength, Stanley and I have taken the first step to untie the knot of doubt and self-questioning we had been wrestling with for a long time, and step out of our comfort zone to bless others.

In return we have both been abundantly blessed by the testimonies of locals we met in Indonesia. We learned so much from the children there who worshipped freely and gave us their undivided attention when we shared stories with them.















FAR FROM THE TOURISTY AND CROWDED BEACHES OF PHUKET AND THE STREETS OF BANGKOK, THE THAILAND HIGHLANDS ARE AN OASIS OF GREEN FORESTS AND FRESH MOUNTAIN AIR. Here you will discover a diverse mix of local people groups holding firm to their traditions and preserving a unique culture that has endured many centuries in this remote corner of the world.

The 3-hour journey by jeep up to the mountains is akin to the windy turns of the Singapore Formula One race except the road is unpaved, and so the ride is a little bumpy and dusty at times. Once you have reached the top, be prepared to be welcomed by curious and excited locals, some dressed in colourful handwoven tunics.

Known to be hospitable, they will open their homes to you, one after another, and invite you to sing and fellowship with them. Their simple homes are perched on stilts, with split bamboo walls and floors, and thatch roofs. A fair number of chickens, cows and pigs are kept under the houses at night.



"Go out with joy and be led forth with peace. The mountains and hills will burst into song before you!"



As you talk with them you'll learn that the tribal folks living in these rural parts have limited access to medical treatment, and so many of the elderly suffer from persistent coughs and body aches without relief, while the children suffer from severe toothaches. If you are a medical professional or have a background in medicine, these villagers greatly need your advice and help.

Meal time is a homely and casual affair, with everyone seated in a circle on floor mats. Although the food prepared by a local family is simple, one can definitely sense warmth and generosity as the meal is shared.

Sleeping bags, soft yoga mats and warm pajamas are strongly recommended as the night is chilly and there are no mattresses up in these highland villages. (Imagine trying to drive a big mattress up the mountain road!) But although the sleeping conditions are different from home, you can also expect a wonderfully memorable surprise as night falls in the rural highlands.

Looking up at the night sky, you will be filled with awe at the vast number of stars visible to the naked eye, and if you are alert enough, you may even spot a shooting star or two! What you've read in Genesis 15:5 will begin to really come alive: "Now look toward the heavens, and count the stars – if you are able to count them," God said to Abraham.



CMC is running a number of outreach trips to villages in these Thailand highlands this year which involve visiting local churches, running activities for children and giving free medical consultation to villagers. If you set out to visit Thailand with the intention of being a blessing and showing God's love to locals, I guarantee you will be amazed how God works in lands different to ours, and you will return from the trip greatly blessed!

I have been a pastor at Thanyaburi Klong Paed Methodist Church for 1 year and 6 months. We have about 30-40 worshippers at our Sunday service, and we also run a Wednesday evening cell group. Our vision for this year is "We must go out and serve others because God loves us." My desire is to make disciples that make other disciples.

I have a team serving with me, but because I am the only full time staff, it has been a challenge for us to meet together and get things done. For example, we started a Saturday class to teach English to children, but we had to stop this activity because our church members were unable to continue running it.

I also need to go out and visit the homes of people who stay near our church, to get to know them and invite them to our church. But because I am a single lady, I often need to wait for church members to be free to accompany me on these visits, especially when I am visiting men.

We have many youth in our church but they are so new that they don't know much about how to plan or execute activities. This neighbourhood is quiet so we need to do children's camps and English classes to attract the children to us. Hopefully they enjoy themselves and learn so much that their parents will trust us to send their children to church regularly.

We also need help discipling our youths so that they become spiritually mature as they serve in ministry. Some of our worship team members just play instruments, but I want them grow in their spiritual walk too.

Please consider coming to partner with me in growing our young congregation, and teaching English to our neighbourhood children.

"I come from a non-Christian family. When I was a university student in Chiang Mai, I met a Korean missionary family that took care of me very well and that was when I decided to receive Jesus. My family didn't accept me being a Christian and as a result we fought a lot. In fact, I was kicked out of the family until about 5 years ago, but never mind, I believe Jesus will heal the hurt in me and that He will always reaffirm my worth. Today I am good with my family, but they are not Christian yet. I believe a seed was planted in them through me, and I hope that one day my family will come to know Jesus too."

"I try to use my ice cream shop to reach out to people in this neighbourhood. Last year we organized a Christmas party and announced that we were giving away free snow ice desserts. A few hundred people turned up and I had the chance to share the gospel with them. Many showed interest in Christianity but we didn't have enough manpower to follow up with them one by one after the event. They have already heard the gospel, but we need some assistance from your church teams to visit and follow up with them, and invite them to church again."

"I am from a non-Christian family. I accepted Christ at age 17, but it took a long time and a lot of patience to prove to my parents that my decision to become a Christian was a good one. She finally agreed to open her home for our Christmas caroling activity, and finally, in 2015, she came to church with me and accepted Christ. I continue to pray that my father will understand what the love of Christ is, be open to coming to church, and that the whole family can one day worship together."

GOING ON TWO OUTREACH TRIPS TO INDIA IN 2015 AND 2016 PROVED TO BE A GREAT BLESSING TO ME, AND HELPED RID ME OF MY INHERENT FEARS, PREJUDICES AND RACISM.

Before I left on the first trip I was full of fears. To encourage and help me, God gave me a caring and prayerful roommate who even prayed over our bedroom in India! On the second trip I shared my room with a young, God-fearing university student. Both these room mates were such a blessing to me, as I am in my 80s and not as quick on my feet as I used to be!

In the mornings we visited villages and distributed rice to needy families. After sharing God's word and love with the crowds gathered there, we offered to minister to locals who asked for prayer. One of my greatest fears was praying for the sick, but we had been given training on how to pray for healing, and it was very heartwarming to see how Jesus healed the blind, enabled the lame to walk and brought relief to many who had other physical ailments. We also had students asking God to help with their studies, couples asking God for help to conceive, and many others who just desired anointing or blessings from God. I was very touched to see the great faith these poor people had.

On one occasion, a lady with a very feverish baby asked me to pray for her little one. In Singapore we parents would be very frightened if any of our children had such a high fever! I felt compassion for this mother and child, but all I had to offer at that moment was prayer. So I reminded myself that it is God who heals, not us, and then I just prayed. After my prayer, the little baby lifted her head and smiled at me, and I thanked the Lord and praised His name. O what joy I felt!

How blessed we all are here in Singapore!

When I saw the conditions in which many Indians live, I asked God to forgive us for complaining although we have so much. He even provides for us outside of Singapore when we are on mission. In 2015 our team managed to depart the Chennai airport just before it was shut down due to heavy flooding and bad weather. In 2016 He provided an alternative venue for one of our night rallies when it began to rain heavily.

Don't worry about your safety, comfort and inadequacies during a mission trip. God sees to all our needs and cares for all his children. If I can manage a trip, so can you! Join our CMC outreach efforts while you are still in good health and your legs are still able to walk.

EVELYN is an active granny who loves travelling, cooking, sewing, and experiencing life to the fullest. She went on 3 mission trips to Cambodia and India while in her late 70s and early 80s, and though she is a little less mobile now, she still desires to serve God in whatever way she can. "I grew up in Bali living with my parents and sister. Life there was simple, but very happy. My mother is a Christian and my father is not, but he gave us the freedom to choose what we want to believe in. So I followed my grandmother to church from the time I was young, and believe that Jesus is the one who has held me up during the darkest times of my life.

In 2013, I married a young, hardworking man from Surabaya who was employed in Bali. We were so in love! But shortly after our marriage, his motorbike crashed into a truck and he died instantly. At a young age, I became a widow.

I cried so much and could not eat for days. I would often visit the church, sit in the sanctuary by myself and cry. At the time nobody knew I was pregnant, but when friends eventually found out, some advised that I abort the child because I was young and still had many years ahead of me. Life can still go on, they said. Perhaps I would have the chance to remarry.

I know that if I did not have Jesus in my life, at that point I would have crumbled. Their advice seemed logical, but it was not something I could go through. Knowing that God was with me and that a child was growing inside me gave me strength I never knew I had. Slowly, I found the courage to accept what had happened, and took small steps to move on after grieving.


I really thank God for the family I work for in Singapore, who helped and supported me a lot during that difficult season, waiting patiently until I could settle all my problems before getting back to my duties. My sister and friends back home also helped me out financially, because of the many medical checkups I had to go through during my pregnancy. It really takes a village to raise a child.

My baby girl is now almost 2 years old. I am contented with life and came to visit Christ Methodist Church this year with my employer. It is nice to be able to worship God with a church family.

Sometimes, people ask me if I will get married again, but it is not my focus. For now I am devoted to my child and my family, and even though I have no husband, I know that with Jesus I can be strong in character, love others and grow in the fruit of the Spirit through any adversity".

He first met Shu Yann when she was managing a Scripture Union book store that he frequented, but it was only when he was seconded to New Life College in Bangalore that they really connected. Her mission team visited India, and the 16-hour train ride from Bangalore to Goa gave them the opportunity to talk and get to know each other better. Their relationship blossomed in the mission field, and they have now been married for 27 years. (Lesson: if you're single and ready to mingle, try a mission experience!)

THE PROGENY:

Pastor Vincent and Shu Yann have two children – Abraham, 26, works as a civil engineer, and Grace, 25, works fulltime at Bedok Methodist Church.

MYSTICAL THRILLS:

Vincent was exposed to multiple religions at a very young age because his non-Christian parents were serious about their personal religion. As a youth he assisted in a Chinese house temple and spent nights at the temple, but also learned to say prayers like Hail Mary and the Lord's Prayer during his education in Roman Catholic primary and secondary schools.

ENCOUNTERING CHRIST:

In his pre-university days, he was befriended by many earnest Christians who met together to pray, made it known they were praying for him every day, and persistently asked him to visit their church. He resisted for many months but finally relented and had his very first church experience, at which he was unexpectedly drawn to the Lord! He said yes and committed to give his life to Jesus right there and then.

THE STRUGGLE:

Becoming able to live out that commitment was not an overnight process for Pastor Vincent though. There were many days he would go to church in the morning and then visit the Chinese house temple in the evening. He even progressed to become assistant to a Chinese medium there, but the spiritual duplicity was wearing a hole in his heart. He was so tired of living two faiths, and one day at a temple festival, as the drum beats and chanting began to lull him into the usual trancelike state, he asked Iesus to deliver him from the terrible struggle. When he regained clarity, he realised that he was standing on the other side of the road, opposite the temple, and drenched in cold sweat. He had no idea how he had gotten there or even crossed the street! So he ran home



and surrendered himself completely to Jesus.

GOD WILL PROVIDE:

Pastor Vincent sensed God calling him to full-time ministry but was reluctant at first. He tried applying for many other jobs, but none worked out. His last desperate attempt to avoid God's call was applying for a job as a car wash attendant, which he was totally overqualified for. But even they rejected him! So he approached his pastor, who advised that he be equipped in bible school. Vincent told him that he had no means to pay the school fees. His pastor simply remarked "God will provide" and asked him to go ahead. On the day of his admissions interview, he brought his application forms but no fee. To his amazement, he was granted an exception, and told he could pay later. Over the next 4 years, God provided for him financially and in many other ways that humbled and prepared him for a life of fulltime ministry.

LIMITATIONS:

Pastors do not have the answers to every spiritual or life question. When someone from the congregation asks for advice, they don't always know the answer and feel torn between wanting to help and wanting them to experience God's providence. But Pastor Vincent has learned over time that our human limitations also help strengthen our faith as we journey through life and realize that God is doing most of the work.

LAND OF ORIGIN:

Liaoning, Liaoyang, North-East China

ADOPTIVE HOME:

Tianfu arrived here at age 11, accompanied by his mother, to pursue an education in Singapore through Peixin Primary School, Yuying Secondary School, and Temasek Junior College.

They happened to be living in an apartment right next to CMC when they

first arrived, and someone from our dialect outreach ministry invited them to a free breakfast one weekend morning. Tianfu and his mum later began attending the Cantonese service, and when our Mandarin Ministry was launched in 2003, Tianfu found himself at home with the other PRC youths there. He was baptised at the Christmas Mandarin Service in 2006, and his mum returned to China in 2013 when he enlisted in National Service.

SWITCHING CULTURES:

As a kid he was able to adapt to a new culture pretty quick, although he did feel home sick at times. Initially he was only comfortable interacting with other kids from China, but as time passed he started befriending Singaporean kids too. It helped that schools here have cultural integration programmes like 'Racial Harmony Day' and guided excursions to places like Little India and Chinatown, which give

students better understanding and appreciation of the many people groups that live in Singapore. It took him some time to get used to Singlish though, and he's grateful that many Singaporeans are bilingual so he could express himself in Mandarin and still be understood a lot of the time.

FACING PREJUDICES:

Despite the educational aids and many cultural similarities that were in his favour,
Tianfu found that it was still difficult to be fully accepted as a foreigner at times. He remembers an incident where a classmate made fun of him and attempted physical abuse while they were walking back to the classroom from the canteen.

HONEST OBSERVATIONS:

A couple of negative encounters like that at school are more than enough to adversely affect a young persons' worldview forever, but by God's grace Tianfu grew to appreciate life here so much he decided to stay on. He insists that Singaporeans are generally well mannered, friendly, and welcoming towards strangers. He recalls a day when he and his mum asked a local man for directions and ended up being personally escorted to their destination by him.

As a PRC who grew up in Singapore, Tianfu is in a unique position to comment on interacting with our brothers and sisters from mainland China. He feels both Singaporeans and Chinese can still make greater effort in letting go of their preconceived notions and prejudices towards one another, and be more sensitive in the way they speak to and about each other.

PERSONAL GOALS:

As a student, his dream was to become a doctor, but he confesses to "slacking off" too much during junior college days to be able to realise that dream. The desire to impact lives for good never left him though, and as he practiced the spiritual disciplines of Word and prayer that are highly encouraged by the Mandarin ministry, Tianfu began to see that God had been shaping him for a life of ministering to others through his career. He started working in our church office as a means to self-fund studies in music production with Orita Sinclair School of Art and New Media, and hopes someday to minster to tribal children in East Asia through music.

CHURCH FAMILY:

Tianfu's attitude and life goals have been inspired by our

dialects ministry coordinator, Mr Alvin Teh, whom he has observed to be "a preacher that practices what he preaches." For example, Alvin taught all the young people under his charge (like Tianfu) the virtue of humility by rallying them to wash the toilets every week in our former church building.

CMC's Mandarin Ministry was also instrumental in helping Tianfu develop a joyful and thankful spirit despite life's hardships in school and at home. Even though he has no family living with him at the moment, now, he counts Jun Han, Hao Ran and Caleb from the Mandarin Ministry among his closest "brothers", and Pastor Alvin Teh as a role model and father figure in his life.

Tianfu desires to grow in intimacy with the Lord, learn more about different expressions of worship and praise, become a better guitar player, and eventually write and produce his own music. He hopes to meet that special someone God has prepared for him and build a family too. Do keep him in prayer as he labours on in our church office, answering queries from the congregation daily and supporting our huge GONations initiative this year. 00
