

Have you ever felt like life was pressing in from all sides – like you were barely holding it together, spiritually dry, and unsure if you could keep going?

Psalm 119:73-96 speaks directly into those moments. It shows us not to gloss over pain but instead points us to the sustaining power of God's Word and the redemptive purpose He brings through it.

GOD'S WORD SUSTAINS US IN AFFLICTION

"I am like a wineskin in the smoke" (v83)

In ancient times, wineskins (made of animal hide to store liquids) were hung near fires to dry. When exposed to too much smoke, they would shrivel, crack and lose their usefulness.

The psalmist uses this image to describe his extreme exhaustion and sorrow – fragile, stretched, close to breaking. Yet even in his suffering, he declares, "I do not forget Your statutes," choosing to press into God's Word.

I have lived this truth.

15 years ago, I found myself in one of the darkest seasons of my life – pregnant and alone while still in university.

I had been far from God for many years, and the shame, fear and isolation felt unbearable. I truly believed I had ruined my life, much like that wineskin – damaged, forgotten, and drying out in the smoke.

The psalmist writes, "If your law had not been my delight, I would have perished in my affliction" (v92).

That is the truth I experienced firsthand. In that place of brokenness, God's Word became my lifeline, reminding me that I was not forsaken. It spoke of His steadfast love, mercy, and power to redeem even the most painful circumstances.


YOUR FAITH CAN ENCOURAGE OTHERS

Because of what I have walked through, God has brought many women into my life who were struggling with relationships, sexual sin, broken marriages, or unexpected pregnancy, and He allowed me to point them to the same hope I found.





REFLECT

- > Have you ever felt like that wineskin in the smoke – worn out, ashamed, or close to breaking? What would it mean to hold fast to God's Word there?
- Is there a part of your story that you've struggled to see as redeemable? How might God be inviting you to see it through the lens of His grace?
- > Who in your life might need to hear your testimony – not the polished version, but the real one that reveals God's mercy and redemption?
